Family Literacy Training Works!

Step By Step Learning® conducted a series of five 90-minute family literacy training sessions through the 2006-2007 school year for families whose children were entering Kindergarten in the fall of 2007. Families participated in a large group session during which they learned about a particular literacy topic while their children played literacy games, supervised in another room. Discussion topics included: reading aloud to your child, vocabulary, letter recognition, phonological awareness, and letter-sound correspondence. Families were then divided into smaller breakout groups, each with a teacher volunteer, to practice the lessons related to the topic that was discussed in the larger group. The children were then reunited to their families, who then practiced the newly learned lessons with their child(ren). Teacher-trainers provided real-time feedback and guidance 🌟 These findings suggest that providing families with literacy to the families as they worked through the lessons.

Overall, the District's kindergarten Fall benchmark scores improved over 25% from any of the previous five years that DIBELS® data was collected, which was due to the Family Literacy Training Program designed and developed by Step By Step Learning®.

The Results are Clear

- To determine the effectiveness of the family sessions in improving their children's literacy skills, comparisons were made between the Kindergarten literacy skills of students whose families participated in the program (the intervention group) and students whose families did not participate (the comparison group). The results suggest that the family sessions had a significant effect on improving certain literacy skills for children. Moreover, these effects were demonstrated upon the children's entry into Kindergarten, as well as later in the school year.
- Program participants entered Kindergarten with higher skills in Letter Naming Fluency. Additionally, their performance in Nonsense Word Fluency, Phoneme Segmentation Fluency, and Initial Sound Fluency continued to be significantly higher throughout the school year than that of students in the comparison group. Families provided their children with more assistance in particular literacy skills during the year prior to Kindergarten entry, as a result of their participation in this program.
